During the first week of March, I attended The National Agricultural Education Summit in Orlando, Florida. Several people from Texas were also in attendance, and they included VATAT Vice President Russell Thomas, Texas FFA Executive Director Tom Maynard, Texas FFA Leadership Development Coordinator Blaze Currie, Joanne Shelton, Texas FFA Foundation, Jerome Tymrak, Texas A&M Kingsville, Dr. Julie Harlin, Texas A&M and Boot Chumbley, Texas Tech. The Summit was developed and conducted by members of the National Agricultural Education Council. Facilitators and presenters included Dr. Steve Brown, Interim National FFA Advisor; Dr. Dwight Armstrong, COO of the National FFA Organization and Jim Armbruster, from the National FFA.

The focus of the Summit was SAE, Experiential Learning and Transformational Leadership. Well, right from the get go I had to get out my iPhone and start looking up some definitions online. I had to use my phone and not my laptop, since this was one of those fancy hotels that cost a lot, but offers nothing. Why is it the more you pay the less you get? No free internet. No free breakfast. No free parking. We need more La Quintas where rooms are reasonable, parking is close and free, no-cost wireless internet in every room and a free-hot breakfast

Contest participation and leadership positions will also be recorded on this site to help students fill out scholarship and proficiency applications. Record book integration was also discussed as a possibility in the future.

The presentations were interesting and made me realize how fortunate we are here in Texas. Our FFA membership is at an all-time high, which has helped to boost the National membership as well. Thanks to Tom Maynard for his work in getting our affiliation fee schedule approved; it makes it more economical to have more members with the sliding



scale approach. The more you have, the more discounts you receive. It only makes sense to offer those incentives, if you want chapters to participate. Tom carried that forward to National FFA and look what it has done for our membership. This is the type of proactive approach Texas has taken to help our students, and it is paying off. We wanted to be part of the solution and not the problem.





National Teach AG Day was March 24. I hope each of you took the time to encourage your students to look at a career in agriculture education. Administrators

In my forty plus years of working in and around public education, I feel there are three types of administrators. There are those who take the job to make a difference, those who were not successful in their teaching jobs, but wanted to stay in public education and those who did not like teaching, but loved the power that came with administration. Almost the entire first group makes good administrators, and about half of the second group makes good administrators. There are very few in the third group who make good administrators, and the rest mostly make life miserable for the teachers they are supposed to lead.

The question is how do we get more of the “Make a Difference” administrators and be able to work with the “Power Hungry” administrators? First, we need to identify the teachers who would be good administrators and encourage them. Most of them are not self-centered and encouragement gives them validation to move forward. They are usually very good teachers who enjoy the classroom. This is why they need to be encouraged. Many of the teachers who are sure they will be great administrators are not as good as they thought they would be.

Working with the “Power Hungry” administrators is very difficult. They are trying to please everyone, but the teachers, and they treat the teachers like they are their own personal employees. They always have a few loyal teachers who serve as their lieutenants, keeping them informed on all issues. These administrators are usually very insecure, even though they like power, which is why the lieutenants are necessary. These are the schools that are very tense, so to succeed you have to work within the administrator’s system. You can never say anything negative about the administrator because you never know who is listening. It is a shame that is how it works, but that is the way it is. You need to work with that administrator’s ego; they need to feel like they are in charge. You, as a teacher, need to make them feel that way. You hope someone higher up will see the problem and get it fixed, or the administrator moves on.

I was asked early in my career what I did not like about working in education. My answer then and my answer when I leave this job is the same. I hated the politics of education. The cause for most of the politics is unqualified or ineffective administrators and school boards. To survive in this situation you must know how to work in the system. The sad thing is in any job you work with people, politics play a part.

What?

This is a contest for states to compete against each other by implementing Teach Ag Activities before, during, and after National Teach Ag Day March 24, 2011. The state that has the most impact will win. Impact will be based on the ratio of NAAE members versus number of people impacted and other criteria as set forth by the scoring rubric. Therefore smaller states will have the same opportunity as larger states.

When?

Your Teach Ag Activities must take place sometime during the month of March 2011 and be completed by March 31st. All entries must be postmarked and mailed via traditional mail no later than April 15, 2011.

How?

This is the fun part. There are no limits on the ways you can celebrate or the number of different events you can have. You may do a statewide collaboration that every program takes part in or have individual programs/people implement their own activity and submit them all as one. Maybe you want to hold a rally at the capital, or have a teaching minutes challenge. Perhaps your state decides to participate in an ag teacher swap across the state. The sky is the limit. If you have an administrator like these individuals, let them know you appreciate the job he or she does.

Ag Ed and Texas FFA Day at the Capitol



FFA chapters from across Texas attended the 2nd Annual Agricultural Education and Texas FFA Day at the Capitol hosted by the Texas FFA Association, the Vocational Agriculture Teachers Association of Texas, and the Texas FFA Foundation. Texas FFA Day at the Capitol was held February 22, 2011, in Austin, Texas in conjunction with National FFA Week.

There were more than 65 chapters that comprised more than 500 FFA members and advisors across Texas who participated in this event in order to learn about the history of the Texas State Capitol and the legislative process through tours and workshops. Attendees had the opportunity to meet with their respective state representatives and senators to discuss the importance of agriculture, agricultural education and FFA to the state of



Texas. The legislators also shared with FFA members their perspective on the issues facing the 82nd Legislative Session.

Attendees watched resolutions being presented on both the House and Senate floor recognizing National FFA Week and FFA Day at the Capitol. A senate resolution authored by Senator Florence Shapiro, chair of the Senate Education committee,

and a house resolution authored by Representative Rick Hardcastle, chair of the House Agriculture and Livestock committee, recognized the growth and accomplishments of the FFA statewide. Both Senator Shapiro and Representative Hardcastle recognized the relevance of agricultural education with an estimated one in seven jobs in Texas being related to agriculture.

Did You Know...



• Soybean oil is the most widely used vegetable oil. It is found in margarines, salad dressings, canned foods, sauces, bakery goods, and processed friend foods. Soy crayons have been created to replace toxic petroleum-wax crayons, soy crayons are safer to use, brighter in color and less expensive to produce. One acre (43,560 square feet) of soybeans can produce 82,368 crayons.

• Apples are a member of the Rose family. Washington State grows the most apples in the US. The apples from one tree can fill 20 boxes every year. Fresh apples float because 25 percent of their volume is air. In the winter, apple trees need to “rest” for about 900-1,000 hours below 45 degrees Fahrenheit in order to flower and fruit properly. Apples are

high in fiber. There are more than 7,000 varieties of apples grown in the world.

- Peaches are a good source of Vitamin C. The United States provides about one-fourth (25%) of the world’s total supply of fresh peaches. The peach is a member of the Rose family and will have a sweet fragrance when ripe. Most peaches that are imported to the US during the winter months come from Chile. Peaches are the third most popular fruit grown in America.

- Pumpkins were once recommended for removing freckles and curing snake bites! Pumpkins are edible. Pumpkins are 90% water. Pumpkins are used for feed for animals. Pumpkin seeds can be roasted as a snack. Native Americans used pumpkin seeds for food and medicine. Pumpkins contain potassium and Vitamin A.

- The name asparagus comes from the Greek language and means “sprout” or “shoot.” Asparagus is a member of the Lily family. Asparagus is related to onions, leeks and garlic. One of the most popular varieties of green asparagus is named after Martha Washington, the wife of George Washington. California grows about 70% of all the asparagus grown in the US. More than 50,000 tons of asparagus are grown in California every year.

So, go ahead and brag. Brag on others, brag to others, brag on your FFA chapter and ag program and brag on your family, especially your spouse because it may keep you out of trouble for a while. Here are some positive advertisements from local affiliates:

The Atascosa County FFA Alumni Association supports the FFA chapters in Pleasanton, Poteet, and Jourdanton. They became official in December of last year. In this short time, they have helped their local chapters with judging contests, fundraisers, provided hospitality rooms for teachers and judges, and assisted at the county stock show. In conjunction with their local Chili's restaurant, they have monthly fundraisers where guests bring in a flyer and Chili's will donate 10% of their bill back to their organization.

They feel one of their biggest achievements in their first year was raising enough money to give away three \$600 scholarships to a graduating senior from each of the schools they support. Upcoming plans include holding a BBQ Cook-off and Music Fest in the fall. Their officer team and members work diligently to spread the word about our organization via email, text, and Facebook.

The Brazos FFA Alumni was awarded a Texas FFA Alumni Support Grant (\$500) in 2010. The Alumni group (25-30 members) held a dinner/dance fundraiser to raise funds to assist with various trips and expenses of the Brazos FFA. The event included a catered meal, a silent auction, a live auction and a dance with music by the Country Knights. There was \$2000 raised from the auction alone with help from live auction items like a side of beef donated by Kavasovics Meat Market, dinner with the ag teachers donated by Brazos ag science teachers Jayson and Annette Hill, a Queen size mattress donated by the Mattress Shop, and a vintage Brazos FFA hat donated by Freddie Engelbrecht. There were many silent auction items donated by Alumni members and FFA members. A total of \$3000 was raised by the Brazos FFA Alumni. Plans are in the works for another dinner and dance in the near future.
