



For the first time in 53 years, spanning time as a student and teacher, I will not report to a classroom this fall.

I have been blessed to have a great family. My wife, Debbie, has been my greatest supporter for the last 39 years. Our children, Amy and Mark, came through ag science/FFA and used it as a springboard to colleges and careers. Amy is an attorney in Houston and Mark is an ag science teacher in Cleburne. When I first brought up the possibility of applying for this job, I had their unwavering support. Without it, I wouldn't have applied.

Those winds of change really started blowing when I decided to apply for the job of executive director of the VATAT. I sent in my application and interviewed at the spring board meeting on May 21, 2011. I was hired to begin work on July 1 to train with Gerald until the end of August. My experiences since then have been somewhat of a blur. I sometimes feel like a first-year teacher again. I am seeing many facets of our program in an entirely different light. I am truly excited to have this opportunity to serve the agriculture science teachers of Texas. I consider it a great honor to serve as chief operating officer of the VATAT and promise each of you I will work my hardest and do my best to represent the ideals and goals of our great organization.

# What's New with Texas FFA?

# IMS Set to Shutter Record Book January 1

Instructional Materials Service has announced the discontinuation of its online record keeping system, effective January 1, 2012.

The IMS system was the first online system in the state, but advances in technology and award applications made necessitated costly revisions which would have made the program financially unviable.

Students with records on the system will need to print hard copies of their records before January 1. Provisions will be made for students to hand enter record book data into state level award and degree applications for one year and for two years for American FFA Degree applications. The transition will require some students to have a mix of IMS and AET records for one year on state degrees and two years for American Degree applicants.

# **LDE Revision Pushed Back One Year**

The state Leadership Development Committee has opted to defer revision of the state LDE rules. The committee is delaying the revision in anticipation of the revision of The Parliamentary Guide for FFA.

The Parliamentary Guide was authored by Jarrell D. Gray, a teacher educator at East Texas State University, now Texas A&M-Commerce. Gray's Guide, often called the "yellow book," was revised recently to modernize language and gender related terminology, but has not been substantially revised in regard to parliamentary content since the mid-1960's. Robert's Rules of Order has been revised several times in that time span, rendering some material in Grays as outdated and no longer correct. The revision team also added motions which it deemed to be useful and relevant.

Texas FFA Executive Director Tom Maynard says the revision of Gray's Guide and the FFA completion, which draws its material from it, are two separate issues.

"Grays Guide is instructional material. The agency has to examine the curriculum and make decisions based on instructional outcomes," Maynard said.

"Texas FFA needs to examine the instructional material and decide what is appropriate for each competitive event," he said.

The anticipated release for the revised Parliamentary Guide for FFA is spring 2012. The committee also discussed ideas for new events and strategies for revising existing events to make them more rigorous and industry relevant.

# **CDE Revisions Close to Completion**

The State Career Development Event revision teams are putting the final touches on CDE rule revisions. The revision process includes the addition of veterinary technician, environmental and natural resources and home site evaluation events.

Environmental and Natural Resources is a national career development event. Previously, Texas has certified the wildlife and recreation management CDE winner to compete in ENR. National FFA has approved the creation of a veterinary medicine CDE, but has yet to adopt rules. Home site evaluation is a national event held in conjunction with the national land and range competition in Oklahoma City.

A near-final draft of all rule revisions is anticipated for the board of directors first quarter meeting on September 12. Final copies are slated to be posted by October 1. A final update on scan sheet revisions is forthcoming.



# Agricultural Science Educators Attend 2011 Texas Agricultural Science Leadership Institute

There were 28 teachers selected to attend the 2011 Texas Agricultural Science Leadership Institute, June 21-24, 2011 in Austin, TX. Participants for the program were selected from a state-wide pool of applicants and received a full-scholarship to attend the professional development institute.

The theme for the 2011 institute is inside, outside, and beyond. During the week-long experience, participants were equipped with the tools, skills and knowledge to be stronger leaders in both the Agricultural Science Education profession and in their local community. Speakers at the institute featured the opportunity to learn from statewide leaders such as The Honorable Todd Staples, Texas Commissioner of Agriculture, R. Keith Martin, CEO/Executive Director of the San Antonio Livestock Show and Rodeo, Dr. Rick Rigsby and Jeff Lansdell, President, CEV. Other speakers from both the agriculture industry and education brought participants a national perspective on classroom and community leadership. Teachers who complete the curriculum are charged with implementing their personal action plans to enhance student learning and improve engagement between their programs and the local community.

It is the mission of the Texas Agricultural Science Leadership Institute to further the effectiveness and professional stature of agricultural science instructors and FFA programs in Texas. The institute is a collaboration of the Vocational Agriculture Teachers Association of Texas (VATAT) – a professional organization for agriculture science teachers and supporters of agriculture education and the Texas FFA Foundation – an organization dedicated to preserving the strength and future of the Texas FFA. The institute program and teacher scholarships are sponsored through the generous support of Texas-based private industry.




