### My Second First Year

On July 1, 2012, I began my second year serving the agriculture teachers of Texas as Executive Director of VATAT. Some of my duties will remain much the same. According to our Constitution, I am the Chief Operating Officer of VATAT. Operating the "business" of our association has been a learning experience and I hope to be better at this task after a year of experience. Planning and managing conference (with much help), will vary because the location will change to Corpus Christi next year. I am extremely proud of the conference in Amarillo, but there are things to improve. Please e-mail or call me with your suggestions or comments about the conference.

So why did I title this article "My Second First Year"? In January 2012, legislators will descend upon Austin and that is the difference between this year and the last. Another of my duties is to serve as Chief Lobbyist for VATAT. Basically this means I am your main advocate in Austin. Some lobbyists can spread large campaign donations around or "wine and dine" key legislators. I won't be doing that. My role will be in communicating with representatives and senators before and during the session in telling the agricultural education story. Our program is the envy of other education groups and serves as a model for many. We have to make sure they hear our story.

It is my job to identify key issues and pass the word on to you. According to many experts, don't expect to regain school funding lost in the last session. While the economy is slowly crawling out of the depths of a major recession, there are still miles to go. We do hope to escape further cuts. Legislation often comes down to fighting over limited funding. The two causes we know will come up are our "weighted" funding for CTE and Teacher Retirement System changes.

I badly need your help to keep our funding and maintain a quality retirement program for the future. There are 150 representatives and 31 senators who will be making decisions that affect our program. There are 15 State Board of Education members who interpret legislation and charge TEA with carrying it out. I am asking every VATAT member to connect with their elected officials this fall. It is critical they hear from you or they will think you don't care. I assure you that a call or e-mail from you means something. They have staff to log all calls or e-mails on each issue. If you are unsure who represents you, go to our website under Teacher Toolbox > Legislative Updates >Who Represents me. Ask to be added to their e-mail list for regular updates from them. I won't be asking you to forward form letters. Any communication needs to be in your own words.

With 48 new representatives out of 150, a new Chairman of the House Public Education Committee, a new Chairman of the Senate Education Committee and a new Commissioner of Education, it really will be a new day in agricultural education. My second first year will be quite an experience, of that I am sure.

Our Ag Ed Team and sponsors are another vital part of our success. Each of them, such as the FFA Foundation and the Texas FFA, are critical factors.


Just as each of the hunters has a part in the success of the hunt, so each of us plays a role in the success of our association. Let the season begin.



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# What is New with Texas FFA?

#### Scholarship Application to be Converted to Online **Format**

The Texas FFA Association will be converting the Texas FFA Scholarship application to an online process.

Many veteran teachers remember days of tedious, intense labor over a star student's scholarship application making sure information was centered and just above the line of a hard copy application. Each application was a painstakingly executed work of art requiring endless applications of Liquid Paper correcting fluid and a steady hand on the typewriter.

The conversion to an Excel document was an improvement, reducing duplicate entries of identical information and expediting the completion process, but didn't solve every issue. Teachers and students still wrestled with the quirks and idiosyncrasies of a large spreadsheet document that sometimes had a mind of its

Beginning in spring 2013, the application process will be online, eliminating the instability of the Excel document and the inconsistent performance when downloaded through school servers and opened on different platforms.

"The online process will reduce the amount of manual data entry and enable us to use management programs that are more stable than Excel," Maynard says. "It will also allow us to collect selection process data that heretofore had to be collected in a separate process."

The new program will still produce a hard copy application for committees to evaluate, but will also allow for the electronic archiving of applications by donors, who currently receive a box of paper applications.

The new application will be ready for trial runs in November of this year and should be ready for deployment in December.

#### Teams Set for LDE Revision

More than 100 agricultural educators are set to convene in September to consider revisions to the state's leadership development rules.

The revision process is loosely connected to the National FFA's Career Development Event revision cycle. National qualifying events held in the fall and termed to be leadership development events are considered to be CDE's at the national level. However, the state's LDE advisory committee opted to defer the revision process until a near-final draft of the new Parliamentary Guide for FFA, the state's parliamentary procedure text, could be produced.

Revision teams will consider the relevance of each event to the instructional program, revisions to existing events and general rules and creation of new events. Revision timelines are intended to have a finished product ahead of the 2013 professional development conference to allow for adequate briefing and

inservice.

The revision teams will also be asked to crosswalk the events to Texas College and Career Readiness Standards, which were mandated by the 79th Texas Legislature, developed by the Texas Education Agency and Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board and approved by the State Board of Education. The CCRS crosswalk will provide a clear curricular tie for leadership development events and will assist teachers and administrators in justifying resource investment.

#### Proposed Language Addresses Participation of Ineligible Students

The State Career Development Advisory Committee approved new language which would change the way Texas FFA handles ineligible students. The language creates a new general rule allowing for the omission of scores of an ineligible participant, re-tabulation of scores and re-ranking of entries. The new language is still subject to approval of the Texas FFA Board of Directors.

The impetus for the rule change was the absence rule language specifically addressing academically ineligible students. The committee uses precedents set by the University Interscholastic League as a model.

When an ineligible student participates in events in which a team score is an aggregate of individual scores, such as golf or track, the scores of the ineligible student are deducted, team scores are recalculated and teams are re-ranked. In the case of team activities, such as basketball in which a team member's contribution cannot necessarily be numerically separated from the team performance, the entire team must be disqualified. In FFA, most career development events are like golf—an aggregate of individual scores, with the exception of those events that are team activities or include a team activity, such as marketing plan, agricultural sales and food science.

If approved by the Texas FFA Board of Directors, the following will become General Rule #4:

"If a student who is ineligible for any reason, including, but not limited to academic failure, FFA membership, course enrollment or participation on a national or state-winning team, the student's score shall be nullified and the team's score shall be re-tabulated. If the event is a team activity or includes a team activity, the team with the ineligible team member shall be disqualified. If it is determined that a teacher or other school representative has knowingly entered an ineligible student, the provisions of general rule #21 shall be applied."

The reference to general rule #21,refers to what is currently general rule #20, which addresses unethical behavior by a teacher.



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## Agricultural Science Educators Attend 2012 Texas Agricultural Science Leadership Institute

There were 40 teachers selected to attend the 2012 Texas Agricultural Science Leadership Institute, June 27-29, 2012 in Austin, Texas. Participants for the program were selected from a state-wide pool of applicants and received a full-scholarship to attend the professional development institute.

The theme for the 2012 Institute was inside, outside and beyond. During the week-long experience, participants were equipped with the tools, skills and knowledge to be stronger leaders in both the Agricultural Science Education profession and in their local community. Speakers at the institute featured the opportunity to learn from state-wide leaders such as The Honorable Todd Staples, Texas Commissioner of Agriculture, R. Keith Martin, CEO/Executive Director of the San Antonio Livestock Show and Rodeo, Tom Pauken, Commissioner Representing employers for the Texas Workforce Commission, Dr. Rick Rigsby, and Jeff Lansdell, President, CEV. Other speakers from both the agriculture industry and education brought participants a national perspective on classroom and community leadership. Teachers who complete the curriculum are charged with implementing their personal action plans to enhance student learning and improve engagement between their programs and the local community.

It is the mission of the Texas Agricultural Science Leadership Institute to further the effectiveness and professional stature of agricultural science instructors and FFA programs in Texas. The institute is a collaboration of the Vocational Agriculture Teachers Association of Texas – a professional organization for agriculture science teachers and supporters of agriculture education and the Texas FFA Foundation – an organization dedicated to preserving the strength and future of the Texas FFA.


