Vatat Update...

This month you will receive information on the VATAT Awards. You will notice some changes in the award names and see some awards have been done away with. The two new awards are the Media Award and the Chapter Publicity and Promotional Award. The Media Award will take the place of the Newspaper, Radio and Television Awards. The Chapter Publicity and Promotional Award takes the place of the Teacher’s Newspaper Scrapbook Award. The rubric for both awards will be the same. The three parts of the document will be Creativity/Variety, Effectiveness and Quality of Documentation. These awards should allow more teachers and chapters to participate; it should be less restrictive.

On January 11 at noon, both houses of the Texas Legislature will convene. What happens in the next 140 - day session will depend on the size of the deficit. The comptroller will share what the Legislature has to spend during the next biennium, once all of the tax numbers come in, after the first of the year. If reports are correct, the amount will be over 20 billion. This will not be good for any state agency and in particular Public Education. To my knowledge, Public Education has never taken a cut in the state budget. CTE programs are still a great benefit to the students in Texas. With the new funding formula of 60/40, CTE money can affect the school district’s undesignated money.

Every educator needs to contact the local office of their state representative and senator and share with them the importance of CTE funding. Elected officials yield to pleasure and will not support areas they have not heard from. During the teacher pay raise debate in the 2005 session, some representatives did not support the raise because they said they had not heard anything from teachers. They need to hear from us on this issue.




