FLORENCE TEACHER COMPETES IN STATE CONTEST



Florence high school agricultural teacher Joe Barbour was a top three finalist in the Texas Farm Bureau (TFB) Young Farmer and Rancher Discussion Meet and Excellence in Agriculture contests at the 79th TFB Annual Meeting. The results were announced during the meeting's general session Dec. 2 at the Waco Convention Center.

TFB's Discussion Meet encourages problem solving through cooperative discussion among young farmers and ranchers. Four contest finalists discussed how Farm Bureau can help prepare its members, both young and old, for transferring family farms and ranches to the next generation during the final round of competition.

The finalists held a 25-minute conversation on the topic and were scored based on their speaking skills, effective problem solving and cooperative communication with other contestants.

In addition to Barbour, the other finalists in the contest were Dane Elliott of Live Oak County and Elizabeth Wagner of Lavaca County. The three finalists will receive a power tool from Grainger and a pair of Justin boots.

Layne Chapman, a Wilbarger County farmer, won the 2012 Texas Farm Bureau Discussion Meet during the 79th TFB Annual Meeting. The winner was announced during the meeting's general session Dec. 2 at the Waco Convention Center.

Barbour is in his third year at Florence High School. He received his Bachelor of Science in Agricultural Education from West Texas A&M University and his Master of Science in Agricultural Education from Texas Tech University.



along with lesson planning for the substitute while we are away. The best way is to plan early, which was probably yesterday. Some teachers will book their rooms a year in advance. It is much easier to book two rooms rather than eight at the last minute. When you're late, more time on the road will be required from hotel to contest site. Stress can be minimized by understanding the process in your district for purchase orders, check processing and travel requests. Please don't forget the students who are left at home, because they also deserve your best prepared lessons while you are on the road.

I have discovered seasoned teachers understand the timelines and short cuts to get the task accomplished, but the newer teachers often times bring skills that can organize and simplify the process within departments. The last words agricultural science teachers want to hear are: "Who loaded the feed and blow dryers?" "I thought you had the student meal money?" "The score cards and clipboards were left in the office beside the desk." "They moved the contest site; we sent an email out last week."

Let's help each other during this stressful time of the year. The road does go on! Be safe in your travels, have fun and make memories for years to come.

Jan. 8, 2013 - Mark the Date

On this date at 10 a.m., the 83rd Legislature will convene. It will not be the same group that cut public education to the bone two years ago. Four of the 31 Senators will be new, and 44 of the 150 member House of Representatives will be new. The House Public Education Committee will be chaired by a new member, who has yet to be appointed. Senator Dan Patrick will chair the Senate Education Committee.

The State Board of Education only returns seven of the current 15. Their schedule includes blocks of meetings in January, April, July, September and November. Their work affects every school district in Texas.

The school finance court case continues to drag on. Testimony goes back and forth, but I found it interesting that an economics expert testified that low teacher pay in Texas was negatively affecting our school systems. Teacher pay has not kept pace with inflation and around 30 states pay better than Texas. We all knew that. Most experts feel that before this case winds through all the appeals, the session will be over. That means meaningful reform is a remote possibility.

The School Accountability Rating System is being overhauled and if you would like to comment, here is the link: http://ritter. tea.state.tx.us/perfreport/account/2013/proposals.html. It is supposed to put less emphasis on any one aspect (test scores), and more on the overall quality of the school system.

Thanks to a slowly improving economy in Texas, growing our rainy day fund and increased sales tax revenue, many people are cautiously optimistic that we can regain some of the money lost from education in the last session. There will be many other budget line items competing for the money, but education is still on the front lines.

There are still groups out there billing themselves as having an answer to providing a skilled workforce. There are several of these groups that really have opposing viewpoints.

If you haven't done so already, now is the time to reach out to your Senator, Representative and State Board of Education member. As the session progresses, I will provide updates. As bills are filed, I will call on you to contact your elected officials. This can be a productive session if we all work together.

Inspire, Empower and Legacy

How powerful are the words of others? As a young man, I was always told "sticks and stones may break my bones but words will never hurt me" How much further from the truth could this be? If I looked at my beautiful wife and said, "Honey, I love you!" she would probably smile and give me a hug. If on the other hand, I said "Honey, I love you?" I would probably be sleeping with the cattle. What we say can have an impact. What we say can inspire and empower others while living a legacy. With the beginning of a new year, let's make it a point to build people up – inspire, empower and live our legacy.

On Nov. 28, 2012, we lost an individual whose words have touched the future. At age 86 legendary motivational speaker Zig Ziglar lost his fight with pneumonia. However, his words have been shared for generations and seem timeless in touching the hearts of others. In 1983, I was given a copy of See You at the Top. A mentor suggested I read the book and become acquainted with the concepts of leadership contained. Little did I know that book, along with the Holy Bible, would become such a firm foundation for leadership development. Ziglar's words, style and delivery made sense. I got it. More importantly, his message was not about me; it was about what I would do for others. "You can have everything in life you want, if you will just help other people get what they want," Ziglar said. His words were inspiring and empowering. My message was checkered with the words of heroes, mentors, family and friends who inspired, challenged and directed me on my life's pathway. So, I began a career in the service sector trying to share with others the words, opportunities and experiences that can make life a great adventure. Why? Because I wanted everything in life. Ziglar was right! It is in helping others where we find some of the most precious gifts.

A choice about how we will do our job –with or without passion. Simply, we hold in our hands the choice to the legacy we will live. Here's how Ziglar described this choice:

"Perhaps a parable will help you to see my point. High on a hilltop overlooking the beautiful city of Venice, Italy, there lived an old man who was a genius. Legend had it he could answer any question anyone might ask of him. Two of the local boys figured they could fool the old man, so they caught a small bird and headed for his residence. One of the boys held the little bird in his hands and asked the old man if the bird was dead or alive. Without hesitation the old man said, 'Son if I say to you that the bird is alive, you will close your hands and crush him to death. If I say the bird is dead, you will open your hands and the bird will fly away. You see, Son, in your hands you hold the power of life and death.' This I say to you without qualification, and with no mental reservations whatsoever. In your hands you hold the seeds of failure - or the potential for greatness. Your hands are capable but they must be used - and for the right things - to reap the rewards you are capable of attaining."

Ziglar, thank you for touching the future and teaching us all how to do that also. Do you have that special someone who has inspired you, empowered you, taught you how to live a legacy? It is always timely to make an honor gift and say thank you for helping along the way. The Texas FFA Foundation is about inspiring, empowering and ensuring the legacy of Texas Agricultural Education and FFA. However, our effort is not a solo project. Membership Rosters

Traditionally you would be receiving your local FFA Alumni Affiliate mailed to you from the Texas FFA office with your annual roster. The National FFA Alumni is using an online method of collecting dues, working with an online roster, and communicating with us more effectively. Please do not allow this to delay paying your Alumni dues because the roster deadline is still Jan. 31 in order to be considered for all scholarships and grants.

The below information was distributed by the National FFA Alumni. Remember, the ACN is a work in progress.

What exactly IS the Agricultural Career Network (ACN)?

ACN is basically a website. FFA.org will remain the public website for FFA and anyone wanting to utilize ACN will be required to register and setup login and password information to access the site. The site is also personalized to whatever role you have within the organization. As an FFA Alumni member you'll automatically have a record created in ACN. If we have your email on file, when the system launched Sept. 2011, you should have received an email inviting you to visit the site, create a login and allowed you to update your profile. If we don't have your email attached to your membership record, your state and local FFA Alumni leaders will receive a notification directing you how to access ACN. Once you've accessed the site you'll have information, news, and updates at your fingertips. You can update your information and subscriptions at any time and identify the ways you would like to engage with FFA and FFA Alumni.

Question 2: If a member doesn't have an email, does that mean they can't be an Alumni member when we move to the new online system?

No! We are collecting email addresses on our members so they can take advantage of this opportunity to interact with FFA and FFA Alumni online. If a member doesn't want an email address and isn't interested in interfacing with us through our new online system, they can continue to pay dues to their local membership chair as they've always done. The membership clerk will handle the renewal and payment of those individuals as they manage the affiliate roster. Therefore, it is important for the local and state membership chairs to have email and access to a computer.

Do I have to have email addresses for all my members?

When the new online system launches in September an email will automatically go out to all Alumni membership with email addresses asking them to visit the site, update their profile and see what the site has to offer. If you are unable to collect emails for members, as a local or state FFA Alumni leader, you will receive notification on how to grant these individuals access to the web portal to manage their account.

What if a member wants to interact with FFA/FFA Alumni through the new online system but doesn't have an email?

FFA will be partnering with a free email vendor to provide email addresses to people who currently do not have one, but would like to obtain one if for no other reason to access and interact with FFA/FFA Alumni.

How will the collection of dues be handled?

Answer 5: The Texas FFA Alumni is still contemplating how we will handle the collection of dues. The National FFA has offered us two options for collecting dues. Please check on the Texas FFA Alumni website for more details once the method of collecting dues has been established.

Question 6: How will administrative rights be granted to local and state Alumni leaders?

To ensure the privacy of our members, all member information within the new ACN system will not be available to everyone. Local and state FFA Alumni leaders will need to have the ability to view and edit the information for their affiliate and/or state and therefore will be granted administrative rights within the system for a full view of membership, payments, affiliate history, etc.

We are asking each local and state FFA Alumni affiliate to identify 2-3 key contacts who work with their membership and dues payment to fulfill these administrative tasks. These individuals will need computer and internet access and an email address. To register your local or state FFA alumni leaders to be granted administrative rights for your affiliate or state association visit https://www.ffa.org/GetInvolved/ Alumni/Pages/MembershipRosters.aspx.
