What a Ride

If someone would have told me in the spring of 1971 I would end my agriculture education career as executive director of the VATAT, I would have had a good laugh. This should tell every young teacher they can do anything they want as long as they work hard and have goals. We have a number of teachers who work very hard, but do not take the time to set real and attainable goals. The result is usually a teacher who is very tired and frustrated because he or she does not see any real results.

I was very fortunate every teaching job I had was a little more challenging than the previous job. My teaching career began at Austin Anderson in East Austin. Like all my jobs, I loved my job at Anderson. We had a great principal who served as a mentor to me and taught me a great deal about doing my job. The problem was the school district closed the school at the end of that year. Job opportunities in 1971 were the same as they are today with 30 to 60 people applying for every job opening. Austin ISD offered me a job teaching 8th grade science. This job was very important in developing my classroom management skills. I also learned I did not want to teach in junior high again.

In 1972, I took a job teaching agriculture at New Caney. This position was good in two ways; it was a good place to teach, and I was fortunate enough to teach with someone who had come through an established agriculture and FFA program. Lynn Mosier taught me more about agriculture education and the FFA than I had learned in the previous ten years of high school, college and two years of teaching. During that time, my goal was to become a superintendant of a school district by the time I was forty. From 1974 to 1976, I served as a counselor at New Caney High and began working on my administration certifications.

In the spring of 1976, I realized my heart was not in administration, and I wanted to teach agriculture. I took an agriculture teaching job at Humble. This is when I really learned about goals and goal setting. It had been years since the chapter had won any banners. We set goals as to when and at what level we wanted to be successful. This was a very effective way to accomplish our goals. In 1980, I made the most important move of my career when I took the agriculture education job at Katy. This move was significant in many ways. We moved from what had been our home for eight years and into a program that had been successful for many years.

It was not an easy decision going to Katy. I have always been the kind of person who did not want to take a job just to maintain the status quo. It was important to have a positive effect on the program in order for it to grow

and improve. Once I realized this could be possible, the move was easier to make. The first six years at Katy were very good. However, when Gary Vos came to Katy High to teach, the program took on new life. The next sixteen years were phenomenal; we grew from 175 students to over 325 students and from two teachers to four teachers. The success of the program was unbelievable and very rewarding for the students, the teachers and the community.

In the spring of 2001, when Mr. Finstead announced he would retire as the VATAT executive director at the end of the year, I had a dilemma. The VATAT executive director position was one I had considered and felt I could do. I also was as happy teaching agriculture as I had ever been. After visiting with my family and much prayer, I decided to apply for the job, and you know the rest. I shared with the board this spring that I learned very early if I made a mistake when I was teaching, it affected four teachers and 300 plus students. In my current job, if I make a mistake, I affect 1700 teachers and 100,000 students; a very sobering thought.

As I write this final article, I leave you with some basic thoughts. Know what you are capable of doing and be realistic about what you can and cannot do. Enjoy what you do. If you are not happy in your job, find a new one or change professions. We work too many years in our lifetime to hate going to work everyday. Use the words "we" and "us" more than you use the words "me" and "I;" it will take you further in life. Your family has to support what you do for a living. Without their support, you will never be as successful as you could be. If I had any success in my life, it was for two reasons. The first reason was God was involved in every decision I made, and the second reason was because I married the right person.

The Kenneth Hughes Plan

Have you heard of the Kenneth Hughes Plan? Are you a member? The Kenneth Hughes Plan was started to give ag teachers a life insurance plan to financially help their families at the time of their passing. The plan is named after the 1982-83 VATAT President Kenneth Hughes.

How do I join? Active VATAT members sign up by filling out the enrollment form and beneficiary form and pay the initial payment of \$25.00 (\$5.00 administrative fee included). Go to the VATAT website>Member Services>Member Benefits and complete the application and the beneficiary forms and then mail them in with your payment. It's that easy!

What happens when someone passes away? When a teacher who is on the plan passes away, we will calculate the numbers of teachers on the plan times \$20.00 and send the amount to the person(s) listed as the beneficiary. When there is a death of a member on the plan, the members of the plan will be notified and asked to remit \$20.00 to stay on the plan. It's that simple! The more active teachers are on the plan, the more the beneficiary will receive at a time when he or she could need it the most.

What happens when an active member retires? If you are on the plan at the time of your retirement, you will be automatically moved to the Honorary Life Plan in which the policy is the same.

In addition to the VATAT member plan, we also have a spouse plan. If the VATAT member is a member of the Kenneth Hughes Plan, his or her spouse is eligible to be on the spouse plan. The spouse who signs up for the plan pays the initial payment of \$10.00. The spouse plan works the same way as the active plan. When there is a death of a member on the spouse plan, the members of the plan will be notified and asked to remit \$10.00 to stay on the plan. 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A Letter from the Executive Director

Board Approves Minimum Membership Policy

The Texas FFA Board of Directors approved a policy which will require chapters to have at least enough members to field a full officer team as described by the Texas FFA Constitution. Article XII, Section C of the Texas FFA Constitution mandates six officers. A small number of chapters have submitted less than six officers on their roster. Local chapters are intended to be functioning organizations through which students learn to develop and apply leadership skills through executing a program of activities and holding regular meetings.

The intent of the policy is to provide a policy mechanism for the state association to reach out to programs that are struggling to deliver agricultural education's leadership development component which, pursuant to the Texas Education Code, is to be integral to the instructional program.

Texas FFA Constitution, Article XII: Area, District, and Chapter Officers

Section C. The offices of Chapter Associations shall be: President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, Reporter, and Sentinel. Other officers may be elected as provided for by the Chapter constitution. The advisor of the chapter shall be the Agricultural Science Teacher(s) in that school. If an officer moves to another chapter, the office will be vacated and replacement will be elected through according to Chapter constitution.

Texas FFA Policy Handbook Section 4.4(g) adopted June 10, 2011

Chapters which have been in existence for more than two years that report fewer than six members and do not report at least six constitutional officers shall be sent a letter of warning by the Executive Director. The Executive Director shall have the authority to consider a chapter undergoing a rebuilding under the new chapter status of this policy. The Executive Director shall work in good faith to provide assistance local chapters which do not have an adequate membership and leadership development programs to produce enough members to field an officer team. If a chapter remains on warned status for two consecutive years without remedying the deficiency, it shall be considered to be not in good standing. Size of school and other mitigating circumstances may also be considered in the enforcement of this policy.

FFA Board Set to Appoint Delegate Task Force

The Texas FFA Board of Directors agreed in principle to appoint a task force of students, teachers and other experts to examine the current student delegate process.

The current process provides each chapter with a voting delegate for the first 50 members and an additional delegate for each additional 50 or any fraction thereof. It's an old paradigm that may have outstripped the organization's capacity to seat and manage a delegate body of this size. With membership growth, the total potential delegate numbers are closing in on 2,000, creating logistical and facility challenges for the convention. Additionally, the Texas FFA has an interest in using the process to create a leadership experience and to elevate the status of the convention delegate. All of these considerations must be balanced with the need to provide a degree of representation in the affairs of the association.

Each area will be represented on the task force—half by teachers and half by students. The task force will study recent survey data and input and how other state FFA associations and other organizations manage delegate processes. The task force will examine how best to balance the needs of the process and have a preliminary report by the board of director's second quarter meeting in January. *Texas FFA App Set for July Release*

Texas FFA continues search for ways to connect with teachers and members. Soon Texas FFA "will have an app for that."

A new smart phone application is set for release at the 83rd Texas FFA Convention in Lubbock. The application will include convention information, Texas FFA News Online, competitive event results and upcoming events. The application should work on most smart phones— Blackberries, Droids and iPhones released in the last two to three years. The application is part of an effort to connect with members and teachers who are increasingly technology savvy and less likely to browse hard copy publications such as newsprint and magazines.

We don't eat many peppers, so he has been taking them to work and giving them away. A man who works with Kenny raises chickens, so Kenny gives Larry peppers, and Larry gives Kenny eggs. I think it's a pretty good trade-off.



In fact, in the next 50 years, agriculture will be called upon to produce more food than in the previous 10,000 years combined! Not only will food production need to double, but the increase in food output will have to come from the same land currently being farmed. We must grow two stalks of corn where one once grew.

Global population is expected to reach more than 9 billion people by 2050. It is clear the world is going to need more food and energy. Agriculture can, and must, grow sustainably to meet these vital needs. By making sure that crops are collected and processed efficiently and by employing innovation to make the most of every kernel, grain and bean we touch, we will be able to achieve this goal.

We must ask ourselves are we doing our part to communicate the benefits that modern agriculture provides in meeting the world's food needs today and tomorrow? With continuing advances in agricultural machinery, the role of the farmer will become increasingly specialized.

Agricultural engineers work in the context of agricultural production and processing and the management of natural resources. Their specialties include power systems and machinery design; structures and environmental science; and food and bioprocess engineering. They perform tasks such as planning, supervising, and managing the building of dairy effluent schemes, irrigation, drainage, flood and water control systems. They develop ways to conserve soil and water and to improve the processing of agricultural products. In addition, they may perform environmental impact assessments and interpret research results.



She wanted to have a get together for his former students to rekindle old friendships, share some memories and honor him for the service he gave to the Sam Houston FFA Chapter of Houston, Texas from 1970 to 1982.

Once an FFA member, always an FFA member. The leadership skills, organizational skills and plain common sense of this alumni group sprang into action. The dates and places were discussed, and a Facebook group was created. This group page was only open to former students of Mr. Bob Singletary. Although, he has had an influence on more than those who were fortunate enough to have him as a mentor in the classroom.

The group page grew in size. Memories and photos were being shared, and the date of the planned event seemed to loom in the future like a star in a distant galaxy. The date was finally posted. It was the same date as our Area CDEs. I had to mark "tentively attending," but this was for Mr. Singletary, not for Kelly White, so the show must go on.

The Singletary's sat with the members of the "Metallic Club,"gold in the teeth, silver in the hair and lead in the bottom. I did not recognize some people, but others I recognized immediately. Some had graduated with me 30 years ago. Others remarked they had not seen each other for 40 years. A few were lucky enough to still fit into their FFA jackets, which they wore proudly.

What impressed me the most? For a brief moment in time, we were kids sitting around in ag class. We listened in awe as Mr. Singletary shared stories of those days. We wanted that "teacher recognition" again from a man who had touched our lives many years ago.

What a tribute! A tribute to the man who in turn paid tribute to a good bunch of students. The event was a first for this group, but not the last. 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
