Many of you have been planning for the State FFA Convention and the VATAT Professional Development Conference. We are planning for a great conference and I hope to see you there.


Thanks to all of you who attended the State FFA Degree Check. This event would not be possible if you did not volunteer to serve on the various committees.

Implementing House Bill 5

Most provisions of House Bill 5 will be implemented starting this next school year. Some parts of the bill, such as algebra II not being required for all students and the reduction in standardized testing have received a majority of the publicity. These changes, while welcomed by many educators, will have minimal effect on most agricultural education and CTE programs.

Under previous graduation requirements, known as the 4x4, counselors started with the 16 required core courses, and then filled in the remaining blanks. Under H.B. 5, students will have a much more individualized graduation plan. Each student will have to choose one of five endorsement areas: STEM, business and industry, public service, arts and humanities and multidisciplinary studies.

Agricultural education is included in the business and industry endorsement. CTE is cited prominently in the bill that reads in part: "Career and Technical Education is established as a part of the total education system of this state and constitutes an option for student learning that provides a rigorous course of study." It further states that CTE should provide for competencies leading to:

- "An industry-recognized license, credential, or certificate"
- "At the secondary level, an associate or baccalaureate degree"
- "Includes opportunities for students to earn college credit for coursework"
- "Includes, as an integral part of the program, participation by students and teachers in activities of career and technical student organizations supported by the agency and the State Board of Education"

The creation of this education bill provides opportunities for our students that are more clearly spelled out than ever before. A premium will be put on certificates, pathways to college, dual credit courses, and as you can see by number four above, FFA participation. It is now up to the agricultural education community to provide challenging opportunities for our students in each school district. Local and state leaders will be watching.



Texas FFA Update

86th Texas FFA Convention Reminders

Housing

We still have rooms available in the block. However, if you are holding more rooms than what you need, please release those rooms as soon as possible. When we have rooms that are held until a few weeks before, no one can use them. Please help your fellow FFA advisors in this way.

Parking

A weekly parking pass is \$30. The daily rate is \$7 with no in-and-out privileges. If you are driving a bus, parking is offsite at the Will Rogers Harley Lot. You will need to drop off your students and then go park. We will run shuttle vans between the parking lot and the convention center. You should not have to wait for a shuttle for more than about three or four minutes. If you are driving a bus and staying at a downtown hotel, parking options are a bit tight. Some hotels can accommodate it and others cannot. If you need to park in the offsite parking and need a ride back, we will provide a number to call to get that ride back to the hotel.

Registration

We have made a few tweaks to the registration system. Members who are being recognized onstage must be registered for convention to gain access to the building. If you have a member who is coming for one day to pick up a degree, award or scholarship, he or she does not have to pay registration for the entire week, as has been the case in previous years. You now have the option of registering that member for a one-day pass for \$15.00. We have added the option of completing a guest registration through your chapter registration portal. One-day guest registration is \$15. The full week is \$40. Children seven years of age and younger must still be registered, but there is no charge for these registrants.

Cut-off for ordering meal tickets is Sunday, July 13th. Our lunch provider has to be able to plan according to projected numbers. Meals tickets will be available onsite for an additional \$2 above the online pre-order price.

Keep in mind that all convention payments are due August 1.

Things To Do


- Six Flags Over Texas/Hurricane Harbor is always a fun option. Information regarding discounted tickets is available at TexasFFA.org.






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Every beginning has an end and every end is a new beginning - Santosh Kalwar
