and the Texas FFA Foundation operate as Texas AG ED. It has shown me how fortunate we are in Texas to have such an awesome group of people leading our organizations. If I would have started this adventure sooner, I think I could have had the chance to give back more to the profession. I would encourage anyone who is interested in seeking a position to take the chance and run for a seat on the board. It does not matter if you are young, experienced, gray-haired, blue-eyed, male or female; just do it.

Since we are talking about the process, let me try to outline how this all works. It is kind of like our chapter. district, area and state officers. We have to start out on the local level and work our way up. Each area gets a certain number of board members. and that number is based on the total number of paid VATAT members in that area. If you look at the board, vou will see each area has a different number of board members because the number is based on one board member for every twenty-eight paid VATAT members in that area. If more than one person from your district is interested in running, then you will have to have an election to determine who will advance to area.

During the Professional Development Conference, each area



will nominate and elect their board members, who will serve a three-year term. Each area has staggered terms, so all of the board members are not replaced in any given year. After election to the board, you attend the remaining meeting at the conference and then the spring meeting in May. Currently, there are sixty-five members on the board including the officers, past presidents, retired ag teachers

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and university staff representatives.

As a board member, you are assigned to one of the ten committees of the VATAT and attend meetings as needed. This year, the board had a special task. The task was to select a new executive director who will lead our organization for the coming years. This process started when Gerald decided he would retire. Once that was done, the wheels were set into motion to find a replacement. The Duties of the Executive Director's Committee set the schedule and guidelines for the application process. When the deadline arrived in January, there were four candidates who put their names in the hat.

During the May board meeting, the entire board took part in the process with all four candidates sitting down for interviews with all sixty-five members. Questions were asked and notes taken as each candidate had a chance to highlight their careers and strengths as the next executive director. Once the interviews were over, the board voted on the candidate of their choice to select the seventh executive director of the VATAT in its seventy-one-year history.

Just like the hiring of a new executive director, the board acts on various items brought forward from the members of their area. These items are discussed and voted on by the board with a majority vote needed to pass. Some other duties of the board members are to recruit and retain members in our association, meet with committees to review policies and make recommendations, work registration at the conference, review the finances and set the budget, hear reports from the other Texas AG ED organizations and select the future sites for the summer conference.

When the board meets at the teachers' conference, they also elect new officers for the coming year. Any board member wishing to run for an office must have a Memo of Understanding signed by their principal, superintendent, and school board president to ensure they have the support of their administrators. Serving as an officer is a five-year commitment, three years as a VATAT officer, one year as Animal Industry chair and then one year as the chairperson of the Texas FFA Board. Each year, a new secretary is elected from the current board and will serve a one-year term, the following year that person will move up to vice president and then the third year he or she will serve as president. During this time, you are also involved with the Texas FFA Foundation Board and serve on the Texas Career and Technology Council.

One last thing about the process I have not mentioned is how smooth the board meetings run, and this is due to a well-organized staff. Gerald has always been prepared and has his staff ready for the meetings and it shows. It is awesome when a great plan comes together, and the process works to everyones' benefit.

Why Conference?

Prior to 1983, CTE (Vocational Education at that time) programs were considered bonus programs. They were funded by the Federal Government. One of the requirements was every program had to have an active youth organization (CTSO today). In 1984, states began to fund CTE, as weighted funding, with some supplemental funding from the Federal Government also known as Perkins Funding. Each CTE organization came up with a way to justify the new funding. The leaders in Agriculture Education chose the record book and SAEP's for that. Unlike most of the other CTSOs, FFA continued to strengthen and grow. This is a testament of the dedication of our leadership and the teachers to promote the FFA.

As a result, the FFA and its activities have been a very important part of our teachers' conference. This process begins at conference with the state calendar and concludes with finalizing the district and area calendars during the area meetings held at conference. Teachers' committees that work with different areas affecting FFA activities are elected and meet during conference (CDE, LDE, Scholarship, Conference Planning, Degree Check, A I, and Rodeo). This, along with the educational workshops, CEU credits teachers receive and the teacher interaction with exhibitors makes conference very important. For as long as I can remember, committees of teachers and agriculture education leaders have met to plan conference.

I have gotten word from officers and board members that teachers at area and state CDE's have asked if we could shorten conference. For this year, the answer is no. The Association signs a contract with the convention center and hotels for conference, the fall before conference. If we made any changes to these contracts, it would be very costly, and it would make it impossible to do. It would be like having all of the county fair animals on feed and the show date being changed by a month or more. The Association can look at shortening conference next year, but it would be difficult to do all we do in fewer days and still give teachers 30 CEU hours. Some have asked if the conference registration fee could be less. If you will remember, the conference fee was put into place for those who come to conference and do not join the Association or to help teachers get some assistance from their schools. Remember, dues are always less than the registration fee and Association members do not have to pay a registration fee. Conference has been and always will be for teachers, so we will do what the teachers need.

On a personal note, it bothers me when teachers say their schools will not pay their travel, so they will not attend conference. Go back to the first two paragraphs; I think conference is too important to miss. There is too much information and too many decisions to not be there to have input and be better prepared for the year to come. Five out of the last seven years I taught, I paid my own way to conference and never considered not going or leaving early. I also paid my own dues all 30 years I taught ag. I never once thought about not paying my dues. You could always travel with another teacher, share fuel and room expenses. Once you are at conference, the only meals you cannot get free are Tuesday night and Wednesday through Friday breakfasts, if you do not stay at a hotel that provides those items. I am sure many of you are saying he is only worried about paying for conference, but thanks to our supporters and sponsors conference is already paid for. I hope to see you in Arlington.

Convention Registration

Students/Advisors registered through the Roster Management System:

- Registration for Advisors is free of charge.
- Registration fee for Students is \$35. This includes admission into the rodeo, concert, dance and hypnotist performance.
- Registration fee for Jr. Members is \$35. (Junior members must not be registered as voting delegates)
- Please note the hypnotist performances are for the advisors and students only and will be held in conjunction with the dance to reduce overcrowding on the dance floor. (Because seating is limited for the hypnotist, this is a ticketed event. You must pre-register for these tickets through the Roster Management System.)

Chapter Guests:

- The advisor of the chapter needs to register chapter guests through his/her Roster system.
- The registration fee for guests is free of charge, but this does not include admission to the rodeo, dance or concert.

Meal Tickets:

• Daily meal tickets can be pre-purchased through the Roster system for \$8 or onsite for \$10. Meals will be provided Tuesday – Thursday by Fuddruckers (burgers), River Smiths (chicken) and the Texas Tech Meat Science program (fajitas).

Parking:

• Parking passes will be available for purchase on the Roster system for \$7.

Registration Payment:

• Advisors may pay their convention registration before, during or after convention. Please note – all payments generated during the 2010-2011 fiscal year are due no later than August 1, 2011. Please keep this deadline in mind since most school district business offices are closed during the summer. If you will be paying for your registration at convention, you will need to go to the 'Cashier Booth' to pay. You will not be able to make a payment at the area registration table. We will only accept check or money order for registration payment. Sorry, no cash or credit card accepted for registration. You do need to bring extra cash or credit cards for vender booths, pictures, souvenirs, etc.

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How Important Are Earthworms?

Most people probably think the earthworm is only good for fishbait. Well, that is wrong. The earthworm is one of nature's top "soil scientists." The earthworm plays a big role in helping make our soil good enough to grow healthy plants and provide us food.

Earthworms are like free farm help. They help to "turn" the soil. This brings down organic matter from the top and mixes it with the soil below. Earthworms help to increase the amount of air and water that gets into the soil. They break down organic matter, like leaves and grass into things that plants can use.

Worms make fertilizer. When they eat, they leave behind castings that are a very valuable type of fertilizer. If there are 500,000 worms living in an acres of soil, they could make 50 tons of castings. That is like lining up 100,000 one pound coffee cans filled with castings. These same 500,000 worms burrowing into an acres of soil can create a drainage system equal to 2,000 feet of 6-inch pipe. Having earthworms around in your garden is a real good sign that you have healthy soil.



2011 State Fair Swine Validation

The late tag orders are \$10.00 from May 7 - June 10, 2011. The priority tag orders must be faxed to 512-476-2894, and the tags are \$10.00 per tag plus \$20.00 priority postage and handling fee from June 11 - June 16, 2011. All swine must be validated on or before June 30, 2011. The Validation Chairperson must be present when the animals are validated. The change of ownership is due in the FFA office on or before June 30, 2011.

All manila forms, hair envelopes, ethics policies, committee forms and Excel spreadsheets are due in the FFA office on or before July 8, 2011 (Manilas, hair envelopes and ethic policies must be in Alpha order and banded or clipped by classification. Do not staple.) Do not alter tags. Ear notch correction and ear tag replacement forms must be faxed (512-476-2894) to the FFA office on or before July 22, 2011. Any required validation information not in the FFA office by July 22, 2011 will not be validated. *Information is due July 8th*; we do not have personnel in the office to process or call for missing validation items after this date.
