"Reality vs. Perception" How does the public perceive agricultural science teachers?

"I'm not interested in trying to work on people's perceptions. I am who I am, and if you don't take the time to learn about that, then your perception is going to be your problem." -- lim Brown

The school is in full swing and everyone is doing what they do best, which is teaching agricultural science to their students. I hope this finds each of you feeling excited of the task ahead as we prepare for Leadership Development Events, fall livestock shows and fundraisers. Mentioning these events makes me wonder why we participate in activities such as these. I ask you to spend some time answering the question on your own, because I cannot give an answer for you.

As you ponder your answer now, consider how you are perceived by others and is it reality. Jim Brown was dead on and dead wrong. We cannot as professional teachers exhibit this attitude publicly or privately. I know that collectively agricultural science teachers are always striving to do the right things for the right reasons, but sometimes in the heat of the battle we forget to think about other's perceived impressions.

I must admit when I started teaching I did have at least in part some of the attitude mentioned in the quote. I knew I was giving all I had and did not waste my time worrying about what others thought, because surely they could would understand and agree with me. But the maturity and life lessons have taught me not everyone will always agree on what you or your program are accomplishing.

The discussion of perception came up a few years back with my current superintendent. A parent brought an issue concerning the agriculture department to his attention without speaking to me first. Well, as is the case with most schools, there is a chain of command and a grievance policy that outline such complaints. Since this belief was their perception, it was deemed a reality. I was not happy, because their concern could be proved invalid. So, I was left wondering how this could be reality even if it was wrong. According to my superintendent, if it is their truth, then it is the reality. I have spent much time pondering this issue through research and leadership development workshops.

Research shows individuals will align with others of similar beliefs and will distance themselves from those who do not agree with them. The current presidential campaign proves this point. Both parties display negative propaganda in hopes that people will believe it. Before long the information is being presented as factual when there



are very few, if any, facts to support the propaganda. It is all in how the information is presented and how the public perceives it. Once the public perceives something, then it becomes their reality.

To sell their products, the business world understands they need to make us believe their product is better than others. If we believe the advertisement, then we will buy their product. In some cases, more money is

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spent on promoting a product than developing it. They get the concept. Do we?

So when we are going about the day-to-day activities, are we spending as much time advertising our products as we are developing them? The products are the students and the activities should be your Program of Activities. I know I need to improve in this area this year.

Agricultural science teachers should be perceived as an asset for school improvement in their local districts and on the state level. I recommend you volunteer to serve on your campus or district committee to help determine what your program can do to help the students of your district. Also, attend school board meetings to be informed on the concerns facing the district and see if you can be part of the solution.

Texas legislature's previous session proved their perception of CTE was very positive. Many groups have done a remarkable job of promoting our curriculum and activities as a vital part of educating the youth of today. For every teacher and friend of agriculture who has shared their message with your representative, I thank you. For others, I encourage you to make the connection and share your message before the next session starts. A discussion point could be to restore the respect of the teaching profession as a whole and not just with lip service.

Let's remember that perception is reality through the eyes of the beholder, whether or not it is true. Pink slime is a fine example of this. I would never have believed negative publicity could damage the meat industry so quickly. Our profession is to educate ourselves about agriculture and provide the information to our students and the public.

The public will not take the time to learn the truth. It will be research on their cell phone and become reality in less than a few minutes. Let me encourage you to maintain the position as an expert in the field of agriculture and the public's perception of agricultural science teachers will be a great reality.





What's Happening with Texas FFA?

Taxas FFA Updat

Agency Renders Decision on Use of Perkins Funds for FFA Affiliation

Texas Education Agency officials have given the green light for the use of federal grant dollars generated under the Carl Perkins Vocational Education Act to pay for the FFA program affiliation fee.

In a response to an inquiry on the matter, the agency officials stated, "In response to a question from a local education agency (LEA), we advised the district that LEAs may not expend Perkins funds to benefit individual students, but may spend those funds to benefit groups of students. CTSOs are a permissible use of Perkins funds, so the use of Perkins for funding a group membership for all eligible students is permissible."

Advisors should always keep in mind these funds are not paying dues, but a program affiliation fee through which the local program affiliates with the state and national organizations, and thereby making all students eligible for FFA participation.

Career Development Event Updates

The Texas FFA Board of Directors approved nine recommendations submitted by the State FFA CDE Advisory Committee. Most of these recommendations further clarify existing rules or are intended to remedy technical issues.

(a) General Rules: General rule language addressing participation of ineligible students. Heretofore, the general rules did not address academic ineligibility—only eligibility related to previous national participation or participation on a state-winning team. The new rule applies the UIL standard, allowing the dropping and re-calculation of team scores in those events in which the team scores are an aggregate of individual scores. In those events, which are team activities or which include a team activity, teams with ineligible students will be disqualified.

(b) Floriculture: The Floriculture CDE will now use the Universal-C scan sheet.

(c) Land: Two publications are used as references the *Texas Land Judging Handbook* and *Oklahoma Land Judging Made Easy*. In instances in which the two publications conflict, the Oklahoma publication will take precedence.

(d) Land: The Land CDE will have a new scan sheet beginning immediately. The scan sheet used in spring 2012 had

serious issues in those sections which required contestants to "mark all that apply." The new scan sheet will require a yes-no response and is expected to yield more accurate results.

(e) Nursery/Landscape: The rules called for event providers to furnish a copied paper scale. However, the accuracy of the scale was distorted by some copiers. Students will now be required to bring a scale to the event.

(f) Veterinary Science: This contest will now require a qualifying event prior to the state competition. Participation numbers in this event are already near the facility capacity threshold. Additionally, an increasing number of schools will not allow participation in state-level events for which there is no qualifying event. In some cases, having a qualifying event allows local programs to access a different pot of money to fund travel.

(g) Veterinary Science: Rule language regarding scrubs was clarified to require both scrub tops and scrub pants.

(h) Veterinary Science: The board concurred with the committee in allowing the members of the state-winning team from Angleton to compete in 2013. Current rules preclude such repeat participation. However, 2012 was a demonstration year at the national level. 2013 will be the first year that the full competitive continuum, culminating with the national contest, will be implemented.

(i) Wool: This contest will now require a qualifying event prior to state. Participation levels have reached a critical mass at the state level. Rationale related to the Veterinary Science CDE also applies.

Texas FFA to Develop Online Scholarship Application

The Texas FFA Board of Directors approved development of an online scholarship application to replace the Microsoft Excel template, which has had a number of stability issues and problems when opened in other operating platforms. The online system will address both the application and selection processes and will yield considerably more accurate data from across the selection process.


Developers are working to have a working version of the program ready by November 1 with a launch date sometime in December. The content and format of the application will remain largely the same, and the program will generate the hard copy application as a PDF document.

- All manila forms, hair envelopes, ethics policies, Committee Forms and Excel spreadsheets are due in the FFA office on or before December 7, 2012 (manilas, hair envelopes and ethic policies secured and in alpha order)
- Tag alterations Any change to size, shape, form or color will void the tag. Tag will be replaced at the stock show and replacement cost will be charged to the individual.
- Ear Notch Correction and Ear Tag Replacement forms must be faxed (512-476-2894) to the FFA office on or before December 14, 2012
- Any required validation information not in the FFA office by December 14, 2012 will not be validated. Information is due December 7. We do not have personnel in the office to process all of the orders and then follow up on missing validation items after this date.



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Sustainable Agricultural Education and Texas FFA

What does it take to be "sustainable?" According to dictionary.com the definition of **sustainable**: *pertaining to a system that maintains its own viability by using techniques that allow for continual reuse; able to be maintained or kept going, as an action or process.* A fair question would be is Texas agricultural education and FFA sustainable? Does our organizational culture support it?

Organizational culture is the collective behavior of people who are part of an organization. It is formed by the organization values, visions, norms, working language, systems, symbols, beliefs and habits. Organizational culture affects the way people and groups interact with each other.

Creating Sustainable Texas Agricultural Education and FFA Programming. I guess one could argue that since we have been around for 85 years, it is evidence of sustainability and a sound culture. As with most teachers who have had the opportunity to shuffle through the various boards of directors of Texas Team Ag Ed, most walk away saying, "Wow. I had no idea." While staff, sponsors and I may have an idea of what you do on a daily basis, I bet if we stepped into your classroom for a week – we too would be saying "Wow. I had no idea." This "wow" speaks to two essential elements: *sustainability* and *organizational culture*.

Plant – Grow – Harvest. While we are working toward sustainability of our agricultural education and FFA programming, we too are creating an improved organizational culture. People support efforts of those they know, trust and respect – that's our teachers! We need teachers to be the ones leading the change in our organizational culture while showing, teaching and mentoring our students, parents and communities. November is just around the corner and we need teachers, students and parents to help with the *Share – The Experience* effort to promote our Texas FFA. Participating in this program is planting seeds – seeds of involvement, philanthropy, stewardship and sweat equity in helping build our program.

Charity and the spirit of giving have been elevated to a new level in the past few years, following natural disasters, war in Iraq and terrorist attacks around the globe. Our times provide an opportunity to help children learn about charity and the importance of reaching out to others. How do we make supporting our Texas agricultural education and FFA's future become a habit? It's simple: make it a part of your classroom experience; a part of your dialogue when talking about how we create a bridge for those who will follow in our footsteps.

Share. Make it a point in November to honor someone who made your Texas FFA experience special – a parent, mentor, teacher, friend, co-worker, administrator, elected official or sponsor. Additionally, let your students know why and how you are doing it. Challenge them to do the same. Print off an "Honor" gift sheet from the Texas FFA Foundation website and let them save change out of their pockets over the month, bring a dollar a week from home, etc. to say thank you to someone and honor them. This effort is touching the future in an extraordinary way. Not just financially, but through improving our organizational culture.

What One Dollar Can Do. John Bechtel and a few others wanted to start a camp for kids to get involved with agriculture in Hong Kong. They found a one million dollar facility that the company would sell for \$250,000 - a perfect site, location and facility for the camp.

One of John's colleagues said, "I'll try to do some fundraising on the side." For three months he worked at it, but did not make any progress. No one wanted to give. He received one letter from a little girl in Georgia named Melinda Holmes. She wrote: *Please find my ice cream money for two weeks enclosed. Please use it to help buy a camp for young people in Hong Kong.* There was \$1 inside the envelope. That is all they received at the end of three months.


Imagine this: John walks into the company and says, "I didn't quite come up with \$250,000." The company sent the \$1 offer back to the Board where the answer was, "Well, if the camp is going to be used to help young kids, we'll sell it to you for a dollar." That dollar is framed in the camp as a reminder of what happens when somebody is faithful. As of today, over 1,000,000 kids have attended this camp in Hong Kong.

Later on, John happened to be at a church where he was telling this story, and a young woman came up to him afterwards and said, "I was that little girl." It was Melinda Holmes.

Tears flowed as Melinda walked through the camp and saw what had been done. One little girl. One dollar. What will the future of Texas Team Ag Ed and our organizational culture be with hearts like this?


We Can Do It. A sustainable Texas agricultural education and FFA programming? You bet. When we all do our part – we are touching the future and improving our organizational culture.

2. Have a written constitution and bylaws that work in harmony with the National FFA Alumni Constitutions and Bylaws.

- 3. Have a council of elected officers.
- 4. Complete the Application for Local Charter.

5. Submit the completed Application for Local Charter, your Constitution and Bylaws, a completed membership roster to your State FFA Alumni Association.

Your State FFA Alumni Association will forward all forms and documents to the National FFA Alumni Association. Upon receipt of all items, the National FFA Alumni Association will officially charter the new affiliate by issuing an affiliate number,

a charter certificate and a scroll.

"My new beginning" has an active alumni affiliate that supports our FFA chapter through several avenues. I look forward to working with them this year and having a successful program.

One last thing - I wrote of being confused with my new surroundings. I wrote of how the students and parents can be confused with their new beginnings. However, the individuals affiliated with our

program have been thrown a huge curveball of confusion. This school hired two "new" male teachers with the last name of White. I look forward to working with Mr. Perry White in our new beginning. The kids are still confused when calling "Mr. White."

Thank you God for the many blessings you have bestowed upon us. You are great in your own way. Continue to watch over each of us as we travel with the many school functions we attend. Keep us all safe in our travels. In your name we pray. Amen.

Can you believe how time has flown by? The year is almost over and a new one is around the corner. I hope everyone's school year is going smoothly.

Our convention will be held January 10-12, 2013, at the Marriott in Sugarland, Texas. The town square has more than 50 specialty shops and eating places within a two-block walking distance. There is also a mall nearby and the trolley will pick you up and take you there and back. When making your reservations at the Mariott, ask for the Young Farmer block to get the room rate of \$99 per night.

Members may start arriving on Thursday evening. We will have a NYFEA meeting Thursday evening. If you arrive early, we would like you to sit in on the committee meetings and give us your input. Friday is set aside for tours, and a charter bus will be provided.

Our first destination is the George Ranch Historical Park. We will have a guided tour on a wagon to view the different historical houses and structures on this 23,000-acre working ranch, which was established in the 1800's. We will have a chuck wagon lunch on the premises.

After lunch, we will load the bus and head to the Twinwood Cattle Company in Simonton. This 16,000-acre

company houses a high-end horse facility where we will be able to view horses that range from \$40,000 to \$350,000. They have a stable and training facility, along with a race track.

Twinwood Cattle Company also has a 400 head beef cattle operation and are participating in the international venture of a rare Japanese cattle breed, Akaushi. This closely monitored, rare breed of cattle has only recently been made available to the United States market due to Japan's strict trade regulations. The meat from the Akaushi, or "red" breed, is characterized by its extremely high amount of marbling.

In addition to the cattle and horses, Twinwood Cattle Company has a turf farm, a tree farm and a gun range. They have an economist who resides on the premises and will be available to answer questions for us. We will be the first public tour of this facility. The owner has been working to bring agriculture back. He buys property for agricultural use and not for constructing buildings and complexes. After the tours, we will return to the hotel between 4 and 5 p.m. to give you time to have dinner and socialize with friends before the Ag Olympics start.

Saturday is our business session with a brunch and the scholarship auction, followed by various workshops. The evening will conclude with the awards banquet. We hope everyone makes an attempt to join us for this annual event. Award applications are available on the Young Farmer website. Awards for the state must be post marked by November 1 and mailed to the state.

Don't forget we will be hosting the 2013 NYFEA Institute in San Antonio in conjunction with the 2014 Texas Young Farmer State Convention. Mark your calendar and make plans to attend.
